

# DEUTERONOMY: A CALL TO REMEMBER

## Deuteronomy 29

Read Deuteronomy 29, noting anything that stands out to you.

Off the top of your head note the things that God did for Israel in Egypt, to Pharaoh and his servants, to the land, the signs and wonders.

- Read Exodus 7-14, was there anything you forgot?
- What stands out to you about God's deliverance of Israel?
- Moses also mentions the deliverance from Sihon and Og. Read Deuteronomy 2:26-3:22. How does God deliver Israel here?
- What stands out to you about this deliverance?
- Take some time to reflect on your own life. Think of specific times and places that God has delivered you, both physically and spiritually. Note with specificity these deliverances.
- Read Exodus 15:1-21. This is the song of praise after God had delivered Israel from Egypt. Take some time to write a prayer, or even a psalm, of thanksgiving for the ways in which God has delivered you.

Read Psalm 115. This psalm sound a lot like the reminders of Deuteronomy. How does Psalm 115:4-8 help you to understand Deuteronomy 29:2-4?

- How do these two passages shape the way you will read Jesus's numerous statements in this same vein?

What miracles are described in Deuteronomy 29:5-8? IS this how you typically think of miracles?

- Who did Israel defeat in battle? Who settled in their land?
- According to Deuteronomy 29:9, what is the desired outcome of all these signs, miracles, and deliverance?

Read Deuteronomy 29:10-15, who is present on this day with these proclamations?

- Why are they present?
- What is the covenant to accomplish? Who is included in this covenant?

What of Israel's past life does Moses remind them of?

- What did God do to their idols?
- What is Israel warned not to do?
- In what ways do you struggle to not return to your past life from which God has delivered you?
- What does the disobedient person say in their heart? What does this lead to?
- What will come upon this type of person?

What will future generations think when they see the fruit of disobedience?

Our focus this week is: Remember that God's covenant is intended for all people. How have you seen this reflected throughout Deuteronomy?

- What people do you struggle to accept as people God has invited to Himself?
- Who is God calling you to reach out to?
